# **Sparx Maths**

## **Cardinal Allen Catholic High School, Fleetwood**

The Mathematics department wanted to say a big well done to all the students who have been working really hard on completing their Sparx homework online. There have been 120,371 questions answered correctly by our students in the two weeks since we started completing homework this year, totalling a combined 941 hours of learning. Students who are working more independently, practising key skills at home will develop greater confidence and ultimately support their progress in school.

We are delighted a large number of students have accessed additional learning beyond their homework and we actively encourage students to watch videos and practice topics they may have struggled on in class or in previous years and there will be recognition of students with the highest 'XP scores'. If anyone is struggling to complete their Sparx homework, then we are going to run a 30-minute support class in the Aquinas Centre after school each Monday and Friday night. These will be staffed by Maths teachers who will be able to support their learning if they are struggling with any particular topics/questions.

All the students hard work and support from parents is massively appreciated by us all. Keep up the hard work!

# Fairtrade Fortnight 2024



At the start of September Miss Stazka and three of our Fairtrade ambassadors delivered assemblies to three of our local primary schools – St Bernadettes, St John's and St Teresa's. Recently, our Year 8 classes have ventured outdoors to conduct an exciting hands-on investigation into species richness using quadrats on the school field. The students worked in groups, placing quadrats randomly across different sections of the field to sample and record the variety of plant species present. Despite getting a little muddy during the process, they were fully engaged and enthusiastic about the opportunity to learn outside the classroom. The experience gave the students practical insight into ecological fieldwork, helping them understand how scientists measure biodiversity. The mud just added to the fun, making it a memorable learning adventure for everyone!

#### Year 9 Pupils Get Creative with Slime in Polymers Lesson!


This week, Year 9 students had a fun and hands-on experience in their science lesson, making their very own slime as

part of their study on polymers. Polymers are long chains of molecules that play a crucial role in many everyday materials, from plastic to rubber – and even slime! Under the guidance of their science teachers, the students combined ingredients like pva glue, eye drops and food coloring to create the perfect slime consistency. This experiment helped them understand how polymers behave and how different ingredients can change the properties of materials.










### 13 minutes: A Novel by Sarah Pinborough

## **Attendance Matters**

### Attendance at Cardinal Allen – key reminders

- All pupils must be on the school grounds by 8:35am at the latest, where they line up on the courts (playground).
- Pupils are registered in Form Rooms at 8:40am.
- If a pupil arrives **after 8:40am** they enter through the late door (accessed from the main car park).
- Pupils arriving to school late receive a sameday 30 minute detention.
- School finishes at 3:10pm.

We ask that you provide medical evidence for any appointments, such as the orthodontist or hospital. Please email this to: *medicalevidence@cardinalallen.co.uk* 



## Attendance and Behaviour Reward Trip

We are very excited to have launched our first Attendance and Behaviour Reward Trip of 2024-2025. We will invite all pupils with over 97% attendance between the start of term and 19<sup>th</sup> November, as long as they have had no suspensions from school this term. We are going to see the pantomime Aladdin at The Globe, Pleasure Beach on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> December. This was a wonderful trip last year and we can't wait to go again!

It is fantastic to reward pupils who have excellent school attendance – as we explain to the pupils, it is by being in school every day that we put ourselves in the best position to achieve well. Every year, our GCSE results show that the pupils with the best attendance go on to get the best grades.

### **Reminder of Changes to Education-related Penalty Notices**

The Department for Education has made national changes to penalty notices issued for unauthorised absence in term time. These changes are now in effect:

- Penalty notices issued for offences that take place after 19 August 2024 will be charged at a new rate of £160 per parent per child. This can be paid at £80 if paid within 21 days.
- Any second penalty notice issued to the same parent for the same child within a rolling 3-year period will be issued at the rate of £160 to be paid within 28 days with no option for a discounted rate.
- The threshold at which a penalty notice **must** be considered is set at 10 sessions (equivalent to 5 days) of unauthorised absence within a rolling 10-school week period. This may include absences as a result of arriving late after the register closes. The 10 school weeks may span different terms or school years.
- A maximum of 2 penalty notices may be issued to a parent for the same child within a rolling 3-year period, so at the 3rd (or subsequent) offence(s) another course of action will need to be considered (such as prosecution or one of the other attendance legal interventions).
- Only penalty notices issued for absences taking place after 19 August 2024 will count towards the above thresholds.
