Maths



On the last day before Easter, A team of 8 year 10s competed in the 2024 'Maths Feast' competition at Blackpool Sixth Form. They worked incredibly well as a team and achieved a great result.

In May, a team of 2 year 8s and 2 year 9s attended the UK Mathematics Trusts Team Challenge at the Lancaster University School Of Mathematics in Preston. We competed as a team against a selection of private and grammar schools and were the only

school from the area to take part. They did incredibly well and made the school proud with their effort.



In June we welcomed a lecturer from the Lancaster

University School of Mathematics (LuSom) to talk to the top set year 10 students about mathematics at further education and the North Wests only specialist maths college. They then delivered a taster session on Pascals triangle. The students really enjoyed the session and the talk about the college.

Virtual Work Experience

32 Year 9 pupils were provided with the exciting opportunity to undertake virtual work experience. The pupils involved worked with 3 different companies over 3 days, Asden, HSBC and Galliford Try.



Over the course of the 3 days the pupils worked in teams to develop a project that promoted values of equality, diversity, inclusion and universal design. The experience allowed pupils to reflect on their personal skills and understand post

have been developing their Identity project working more independently, with flair and passion. Year



The students each created their own clay tile based on a creature from Greek mythology. There were some fabulous designs, and the behaviour and attitude of the class was a credit to their school. Year 10 Photography Blackpool & Fylde College Workshops



Fifteen students from Year 10 GCSE Photography took part in two amazing workshops at Blackpool & Fylde College. First the students learnt how to create cyanotype prints. This is a photographic process which does not involve the use of a cam-

era. The students gathered a range of natural forms from the garden before laying them out on paper they had previously coated with a solution of iron salts. The image was then exposed through the use a powerful UV light box. Following this the students then took park in a lino printing workshop. They created a design based on their own



photography work, before carving the outlines with a lino cutting tool. It was an amazing day and all students produced strong work to add to their portfolios. Well done Year 10!

Geography Climate Action

The last month has seen Years 7 and 8 take part in an array of activities as part of the climate action countdown – 29 days of challenges that has encouraged our pupils to think more about the climate issue, its impact of global biodiversity and how their contributions can have a massive impact. The countdown contained lots of ways in which you can start to take small steps to address problems and help to create a more sustainable world to lower carbon emissions that are causing our climate change issue.

Attendance Matters

Important Update - Changes to Education-related Penalty Notices

You may be aware that the Department for Education has recently announced national changes to penalty notices issued for unauthorised absence in term time. These changes will come into effect on 19 August 2024.

The changes to be aware of are:

- Penalty notices issued for offences that take place after 19 August 2024 will be charged at a new rate of £160 per parent per child. This can be paid at £80 if paid within 21 days.
- Any second penalty notice issued to the same parent for the same child within a rolling 3-year period will be issued
 at the rate of £160 to be paid within 28 days with no option for a discounted rate.
- The threshold at which a penalty notice must be considered is set at 10 sessions (equivalent to 5 days) of
 unauthorised absence within a rolling 10-school week period. This may include absences as a result of arriving late
 after the register closes. The 10 school weeks may span different terms or school years.
- A maximum of 2 penalty notices may be issued to a parent for the same child within a rolling 3-year period, so at the 3rd (or subsequent) offence(s) another course of action will need to be considered (such as prosecution or one of the other attendance legal interventions).
- Only penalty notices issued for absences taking place after 19 August 2024 will count towards the above thresholds.

Attendance at Cardinal Allen – key reminders

- All pupils must be on the school grounds by 8:35am at the latest, where they line up on the courts (playground).
- Pupils are registered in Form Rooms at 8:40am.
- If a pupil arrives after 8:40am they enter through the late door (accessed from the main car park).
- Pupils arriving to school late receive a sameday 30 minute detention.
- School finishes at 3:10pm.

If your child is unwell and cannot attend school that day, you must phone the attendance line: 01253 872659, select 'option 1' for attendance and leave a voicemail.

Attendance and Attainment

There is an undeniable link between attendance and attainment. Pupil's whose attendance is between 97% and 100% are in the best position to achieve the top grades in their GCSEs. The students with the highest levels of attendance are almost 5 times more likely to achieve 5 GCSEs at grades 5-9 including English and Mathematics.

Only 35% of pupils whose attendance is lower than 90% gain 5 or more GCSEs including England and Maths.

It is not just attainment that benefits from good attendance; wellbeing and wider life chances also improve through being in school, every day.






What is the Summer Slide?





